She received her MA from the University of Konstanz and her PhD from the University of Saarland. Habermas' areas of specialization include the history of the bourgeoisie, legal history, gender history, the history of religion, colonial history, as well as 19th century historical anthropology. Her most recent book, Skandal in Togo: Ein Kapitel Deutscher Kolonialherrschaft (Scandal in Togo: German Colonial History), was published by S. Fischer in 2016.
